IT'S OFFICIAL-WHITEHILL IS A HEALTH PROMOTING SCHOOL

Following the recent accreditation visit from the Authority, we can now officially say we are a Health Promoting School!

The review focused on various aspects of school life and involved a review team from Education Services and NHSGGC studying the evidence provided. The team also met with pupils, parents and staff.

Formal Health Promoting Schools status in Glasgow is awarded to schools who meet a specified standard across 9 quality indicators. Each indicator is assessed on a scale of 1-6 and to achieve Health Promoting Schools status a school must have all 9 indicators at a level of "good" (level 4) and at least 5 indicators at very good (level 5).

We were awarded a formidable 5 excellent (level 6) and 4 very good (level 5).

The review team stated that "the range of health and well being activities on offer demonstrates the high value placed on promoting healthy lifestyles in the school."

Very few areas for improvement were highlighted but we are keen to keep develop our work in this area so will be taking forward the recommendations made in the review report. We will consult with parents/carers and our partner agencies on school health policies; foster greater links with our neighbouring community and increase involvement from parents when planning for health promotion. The Nine Lives of Roddy Hogg

'The nine lives of Roddy Hogg' is a play by the Baldy Bane theatre company that focuses on the main characters, Roddy, his friend and his sister, getting into situations involving road safety. The cast put across the message of road safety in a way which was both funny and entertaining.

The story starts off with the grown up character of Roddy trying to save a girl who has been knocked over (a situation which has an impact on him, as his sister was knocked over when he was a child.) The plot then moves back to when he was a baby, when he was walking in the street with his mum. While looking around, he is nearly knocked over by a car. This situation is used a lot in this play, not only with Roddy, but with his friend, Malky, and his sister. As he grows up he gets into the same sort of situations, to his embarrassment. The play ends on a sad note, with Roddy's sister getting killed by a car while riding his bike home. It was surprising that it was her that died because the whole story sees Roddy nearly getting knocked over and his sister telling him to cross the road safely.

The play uses the audience as minor characters in the plot, sometimes mentioning them talking to characters or not being somewhere where they should. Using audience participation was a good way to get pupils more involved in the play. It also produced laughs among the audience.

At times the play could be funny, at others it could be emotional. There was a good mix of both. With the cast playing multiple roles, and very well too, and sound effects being used appropriately. This play is a great way to show the dangers of the road.

Home Economics News

5th/6th Year "Lifestyle and Consumer Technology" Int 1

Pupils worked in groups at Cragielee Nursery building relationships with the children and developing an understanding of the workings of a pre-school nursery. Pupils then planned and prepared to host an activity afternoon for the children. This gave them the responsibility for the planning preparation and carrying out of a child based event with the focus on healthy eating and personal hygiene.

In the preparation for this event the pupils researched the dietary targets for the pre-school child; made recipe cards; produced healthy eating leaflets and posters; stitched puppets representing fruit and vegetables and made aprons.

The healthy eating event took take place on Wednesday 29th October; pupils presented a puppet show with the theme of healthy eating, hand washing and tooth brushing. The children then took part in a baking workshop given by Whitehill pupils where they prepared a healthy snack using the recipe cards and wearing the aprons made by the pupils. The posters will be displayed in the nursery to give advice to parents and copies of the leaflet will be made available. Ms Shona Elliot (Head teacher) was very impressed with the pupils who made an excellent impact during the events

Comenius Visit



From Wednesday 26 until Sunday 30 November pupils and staff from Heinrich-Schutz-Schule in Kassel, Germany and IES Cardenal Herrera Oria in Madrid, Spain visited us in Glasgow as part of White-hill's involvement in the Comenius Project. The Comenius Project aims to provide opportunities for schools to introduce or strengthen the European dimension into their curriculum by enabling pupils and staff from across Europe to work together on joint projects.

For our project we agreed that each partner school would produce a walk showing the past, present and future of their area. Our cultural activities took in Glasgow Cathedral, the Tolbooth, People's Palace in the Glasgow Green and no cultural tour would be complete without a guided tour of the Glasgow School of Art—a landmark architectural gem designed by Charles Rennie Mackintosh.

We also introduced our guests to a traditional Scottish meal of Scotch Broth; haggis, neeps and tatties; dessert and coffee and shortbread—beautifully prepared and presented by Mr Fleming and his S3 and S4 Home Economics pupils. Mr Hood added to what was an already very enjoyable event by piping in the haggis.

In addition to proudly showing our visitors the numerous cultural aspects of Glasgow, we also introduced our guests to some of Glasgow's best shopping areas to allow for the obligatory souvenir purchases. Evening activities were catered for by visits to the Bowling at the Quay and the Pantomime at the Kings Theatre. We all enjoyed this visit tremendously and are looking forward to visiting our partner schools in Madrid in March and Kassel next session.


Christmas Service
