Visits to the Scottish Parliament





No less than three groups of Whitehill Secondary pupils visited the Scottish Parliament in Edinburgh during February.

Ceara's report on the School Council visit

Our visit to the Scottish Parliament was a very interesting and worthwhile experience. The School Council, accompanied by Mrs Rice and Mr McGovern, were given the opportunity to meet various Members of the Scottish Parliament and ask them about any issues that are important to us, whether they are local or international.

We arrived at the Scottish Parliament and were welcomed by the various members of staff, after going through the various security measures put in place to ensure that safety of the people inside the Parliament. Although this security is necessary, it did feel like going through security at Glasgow Airport! We were then taken into a room to learn a little about the Scottish Parliament and how it works. During this time our attention was alerted to an Independent candidate, Margo McDonald, who is a committed and vocal supporter of Scottish Independence. I admire this woman for having the courage to stand up on her own for what she believes, despite being a brave sufferer of Parkinson's Disease.

Three MSPs were kind enough to take time out of their busy schedule to come and talk to us. The first man was Bob Doris, a member of the Scottish Nationalist Party. The second was Robert Brown, a member of the Liberal Democrats. The final man, Paul Martin, is a member of the Labour Party and a Constituency MSP.

We were given the opportunity to ask the MSPs about any issues pressing on our minds or simply about their own background. They were more than willing to talk to us, although they were silenced when they were asked which MSP they most admire from a party other than their own! We found out that Robert Brown was a teacher before becoming a politician to try and make a difference to Scotland. This will be very encouraging for anyone who wants to be a politician but fears a huge amount of experience is needed.

The final part of our day was observing the Parliament in action. We were able to view the politicians arguing their cases and questioning the motives of their fellow politicians. In my opinion, this was the most interesting part of our day because we were able to see exactly what the politicians are doing to try to improve life for the civilians of Scotland, or indeed whether they are doing anything at all!

Overall, the School Council's trip to the Scottish Parliament was one in which many questions were answered and many issues were raised with the politicians themselves, by the pupils of Whitehill Secondary. It was very interesting to see the Parliament in full working order and we were enlightened to the fact that politicians are normal people themselves, and not simply power hungry people doing nothing for Scotland.




